O Love that wilt not let me go.

Travelling down the Clyde river near Glasgow there is a long pier named "Innellan". In Argyllshire. This was the home of one of Scotland's most famous preachers, Dr George Matheson. Born in 1842, as a boy he had much trouble with his eyes, and at 18 he was more or less blind.

He was an accomplished scholar. After a brilliant university record at Edinburgh, he assisted Dr Macduff in Glasgow, being licensed to preach, and in 1868 was appointed to the parish of Innellan.

This hymn, he said, "was written in the Clydeside manse at Innellan on the evening of my sister's wedding. I was at that time alone.and other members of the family were staying overnight in Glasgow. Something had happened to me which was known only to myself. I was suffering extreme mental distress, and the hymn was the fruit of pain. It was composed with great rapidity: it seemed to me that its construction occupied only a few minutes, and I felt myself rather in the position of one who was being dictated to than an original artist. It was the quickest piece of work I have ever done. I am sure that the whole hymn was completed in five minutes neither did I ever correct or retouch any part of it"

- 1. O Love that will not let me go, I rest my weary soul in thee; I give thee back the life I owe, That in thine ocean depths its flow May richer, fuller be.
- 2. O Light that followest all my way, I yield my flickering torch to thee; My heart restores its borrowed ray, That in thy sunshine's blaze its day May brighter, fairer be.
- 3. O Joy that seekest me through pain, I cannot close my heart to thee; I trace the rainbow through the rain, And feel the promise is not vain, That morn shall tearless be.
- 4. O Cross that liftest up my head, I dare not ask to fly from thee; I lay in dust life's glory dead, And from the ground there blossoms red Life that shall endless be.

This beautiful and fervent hymn took Scotland by storm when it was written over 130 years ago. The *Scottish Hymnal* wished to have it in their new publication in 1885. Dr Peace, of Arran, was asked to write a suitable tune. Dr Peace said "After reading it over carefully I wrote the music straight off and I may say that the ink of the first note was hardly dry when I had finished the tune".
